

History Progression at Moorlands



Year 6



In Year 6, the children build on their knowledge from year 4 and learn about farming in Mayan times.

They then look at the beliefs and conflicts that affected Britain during the Anglo Saxon and Viking struggle for England.

The children finish year 6 learning about the causes and consequences of World War 2.



The main focus in year 5 is Ancient Greece and their impact on modern life. The children learn about their culture and pastimes and society through primary and secondary sources.



They then complete a local history unit and learn about the Titanic. The children again look at a range of sources and how life was very different for the rich and poor.

Year 4



Year 4 begin their historic journey by learning about Ancient Egypt. They look at how they Egyptians used the Nile to farm and the different Gods they believed in.

They then build on their knowledge of settlements from year 3 and investigate the changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age.



Year 3 build on their settlement knowledge and look at the Roman Empire and the impact that it had on Britain. They learn about life in Roman Britain through artefacts and secondary resources.

They then develop that understanding further by learning about Anglo Saxon and Scot settlements in Britain and how they were similar and different to the Romans.



Year 2



In Year 2 the children begin to look at settlements. They look at how castles changed and developed over time and why.

They continue their understanding of significant individuals by learning about Guy Fawkes and Grace Darling.

The children develop their understanding of settlements further by looking at the cause of the Great Fire of London

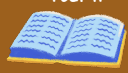
